Air Force hosts service academy rival Navy

Air Force (3-1, 1-1 MWC) returns to action this week to host service academy rival Navy (3-2) on Saturday, Oct. 4, at 2 p.m. in Falcon Stadium. The Falcons are coming off an open date following a 30-23 loss at home to Utah Sept. 20. Navy enters the game following a 24-17 win at No. 16/15 Wake Forest. The non-conference game is Air Force's second this season. The team is 1-0 in 2008 and 4-2 under head coach Troy Calhoun in non-conference games.

Air Force, Army and Navy compete each year for the Commander-in-Chief's Trophy, which is emblematic of service academy football supremacy. The trophy goes annually to the winning academy with the best record in round-robin competition. The President of the United States presents the trophy to the seniors from the winning team each year at a ceremony at the White House.

The 2008 season marks the 37th year of trophy competition. Air Force has a 46-25-0 all-time CIC record and has won 16 trophy titles. Air Force's overall record and number of trophy titles are best among the three academies. Air Force finished second in the 2007 CIC Trophy chase after its 31-20 loss at Navy Sept. 29 and 30-10 win vs. Army 30-10 Nov. 3. Navy won the trophy for the fifth consecutive year by beating both Air Force and Army.

Air Force is on the road the next two weeks following the Navy game. The Falcons play at San Diego State Oct. 11 and at UNLV Oct. 18. Air Force's next home game is Thursday, Oct. 23, at 6 p.m. vs. New Mexico.

The series

This is the 41st meeting between the two service academies. Air Force holds a 25-15 all-time lead. The Falcons are 14-5 at home, 7-7 at Navy and 4-3 in neutral site games. Since the beginning of the Commander-in-Chief's Trophy series in 1972, the Falcons hold a 22-14 overall lead.

Navy has won five consecutive games in the series, including two straight at Air Force. Prior to Navy's five-game streak, the Falcons had won six straight and 19 of the last 21 games dating back to 1982. Seven of the last 11 games in the series have been decided by a touchdown or less dating back to 1995. The Midshipmen beat Air Force, 24-17, the last time the two played at Air Force. Air Force's last win at home in the series came in 2002, 48-7. Navy defeated Air Force, 31-20, last season in Annapolis. The teams first played in 1960 in Baltimore, Md. The Midshipmen won the game, 35-3.

Last season

AP Article - Playing before a record crowd and with Navy's four-year hold on the Commander-in-Chief's trophy on the line, quarterback Kaipō-Noa Kaheaku-Enhada stepped up with two fourth-quarter touchdown runs, leading the Midshipmen to a 31-20 win over Air Force. Kaheaku-Enhada had touchdown runs of 2 and 78 yards.

Air Force quarterback Shaun Carney had a record day in defeat, gaining 300 total yards to become the program's all-time leader with 6,780 yards from scrimmage. Carney also threw for a career-best 237 yards.

Trailing 20-17 early in the fourth quarter, Navy drove 73 yards for the go-ahead touchdown. Kaheaku-Enhada hit O.J. Washington for 53 yards to the Air Force 20. Eric Kettani converted a fourth down at the 11, and then Kaheaku-Enhada scored on fourth down from the 2, giving Navy the lead with 13:01 to play. After an Air Force punt, Kaheaku-Enhada broke loose for 78 yards to put the Midshipmen up 31-20 with 9:18 left.

Navy, which entered the weekend as the nation's top rushing team, produced 302 rushing yards and 381 yards total.

The Falcons outgained the Midshipmen with 474 yards, but were held without a score three times inside Navy's 20-yard line.

Joey Bullen's 29-yard field goal staked Navy to a 17-13 lead before Chad Hall's 5-yard run put Air Force ahead 20-17 late in the third.

Carney completed 18 of 23 passes and ran for 63 yards. Hall had career highs with 8 catches for 108 yards, and he scored both Falcon touchdowns - both on the ground.

Jim Ollis had 73 yards rushing, but his fourth-quarter fumble allowed Navy to run some time off the

clock and protect its 11-point lead.

The Falcons' Ryan Harrison hit field goals of 28 and 21 yards, but he also missed from 41 and 32. The latter miss was one of three missed opportunities deep in Navy territory. Ollis was dropped for a loss on fourth down at Navy's 4 in the second quarter, and the Falcons later had to punt after three penalties pushed them back from the Navy 15.

Last time at Air Force

Navy defeated Air Force, 24-17, in Falcon Stadium in 2006 for its fourth consecutive win in the series. The Midshipmen got on the board with a Keenan Little 37-yard fumble return for a touchdown to take a 7-0 first-quarter lead. The Falcons answered when Chad Hall scored on an eight-yard run to tie the score at 7-7. Navy responded with a Brian Hampton one-yard run to take a 14-7 halftime lead. Matt Harmon kicked a 38-yard field goal to extend the lead to 17-7 with 8:15 remaining in the third quarter. Although that was the only score of the quarter, the Midshipmen shortened the game significantly for Air Force as it held the ball for 13:30 of the quarter and ran 21 more plays. Hampton added his second touchdown run of the game with a two-yard run to push the lead to 24-7 early in the fourth quarter. Air Force answered with a Zach Sasser 30-yard field goal to cut the lead to 24-10. The Falcons added another score on a Shaun Carney to Travis Dekker five-yard touchdown pass to cut the lead to 24-17 with 3:06 left to play. The Falcons recovered an onside kick after that, but were held on downs, turning the ball over to Navy to run out the clock.

The Midshipmen had 325 total yards, including 317 rushing. Navy was led by Adam Ballard, who rushed for 134 yards on 27 carries. Hampton added 105 yards rushing and hit one of five passes for eight yards. Air Force had 312 total yards, including 193 rushing. Chad Hall led the team with 59 yards rushing. Jacobe Kendrick added 40 yards on six carries. Carney hit nine of 19 passes for 119 yards and a touchdown. Defensively, the Falcons were led by Drew Fowler's career-best 18 tackles. Austin Randle chipped in with a career-best 14 tackles and a tackle for loss while John Rabold added 13 total tackles and a tackle for loss.

Ties to Navy

Air Force defensive coordinator Tim DeRuyter coached at Navy from 1999-2001 as the secondary coach. DeRuyter, a 1985 Air Force graduate, coached under head coach Charlie Weatherbie, who coached quarterbacks and fullbacks at Air Force from 1984-89.

Air Force tough at home

Air Force is 7-1 at home under head coach Troy Calhoun. The Falcons posted just the third undefeated home season in school history last year, joining the 1985 and 1998 squads as the only perfect teams at home.

Despite the loss to No. 20 Utah earlier this season, Air Force has been dominant in its eight home games with Calhoun at the helm. The Falcons have out-scored their opponents by 138 points which is an average scoring margin of 17.3 points per game. The team has scored 20 or more points in every game while allowing fewer than 20 in six of eight. Air Force is averaging 31.8 points per game at home while allowing just 14.5. Despite its lowest rushing output since 1980 vs. Utah (53 yards), the team is averaging 310.3 yards per game on the ground while allowing just over 100. Air Force's passing attack has been outstanding. The Falcons are averaging 140.8 yards per game. Air Force has also been outstanding in the turnover battle with a +8 mark. A closer look at the team's home field success follows.

The 2008 season marks the 37th year of trophy competition. Air Force has a 46-25-0 all-time CIC record and has won 16 trophy titles. Air Force's overall record and number of trophy titles are best among the three academies. Air Force finished second in the 2007 CIC Trophy chase after its 31-20 loss at Navy Sept. 29 and 30-10 win vs. Army 30-10 Nov. 3. Navy won the trophy by beating both Air Force and Army.

Last game

Utah defeated Air Force, 30-23, in another classic battle in a historically close series. Darrell Mack scored on a nine-yard run with 58 seconds left to give the Utes the lead for good and Joe Dale added an interception on Air Force's next offensive play to seal the victory.

Utah opened the game with a Brian Johnson 47-yard touchdown pass to David Reed to take a 7-0 first-quarter lead. The Utes added a safety when punter Ryan Harrison miss-handled a snap in the end zone to take a 9-0 advantage.

Harrison got the Falcons on the board with a 44-yard field goal early in the second quarter and the team took the lead, 10-9, with a Shea Smith to Kyle Lumpkin eight-yard TD pass. On Utah's next drive, Jake Paulson picked up a fumble after a Rick Ricketts sack and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown to give the Falcons a 16-9 halftime lead. The Falcons forced three first-half turnovers and turned two of them into touchdowns.

The Utes took control in the second half. Mack scored the first of three touchdowns on the opening

Air Force football best in MWC, among the nation's best in academic success

The Air Force Academy football team, along with men's basketball, wrestling and men's and women's outdoor track and field were honored by the NCAA for being in the top 10 percent of their respective sports in the Academic Performance Reports (APR), released last summer.

Air Force continues to be the leader in academic excellence among the Mountain West Conference. The football team's score of 975 ranked highest among the nine-team MWC. Air Force is one of only five football playing Division I institutions to post a four-year APR in the top 10 percent nationally while playing in a major conference with the football bowl subdivision. Duke, Rice, Rutgers and Stanford are the other four. Air Force football also tops the MWC in the other NCAA academic benchmark of graduation success rate. The Falcons have a 92 percent graduation success rate. The rate is more than 20 percent higher than any other school within the conference.

The APR provides a real-time look at a team's academic success each semester by tracking the academic progress of each student-athlete. The APR includes eligibility, retention and graduation in the calculation and provides a clear picture of the academic culture in each sport. High-performing teams receiving awards posted APR scores ranging from 965 to a perfect 1,000.

Calhoun was named the AFCA Region 5 Coach of the Year for 2007. Calhoun, who was also named the Mountain West Conference coach of the year, joined five other coaches to win the honor. Calhoun is fourth in Mountain West Conference history in career winning percentage in conference games with a .700 mark (7-3).

Young team in 2008

Air Force features one of its youngest teams in history in 2008. The Falcons lost 15 starters from the 2007 squad that finished 9-4 overall and placed second in the Mountain West Conference with a 6-2 mark. The team lost eight starters on offense, including four-year starting quarterback Shaun Carney and all-purpose back Chad Hall, the conference offensive player of the year. Only offensive linemen Nick Charles and Keith Williams, along with tight end Travis Dekker return on offense.

Defensively, the Falcons lost six starters, including first-team all-conference linebackers John Rabold (2007) and Drew Fowler (2006) as well as first-team all-MWC cornerback Carson Bird, the conference's leader in interceptions last year. Five of the top six defensive linemen return, along with outside linebacker Hunter Altman and safety Chris Thomas.

The Falcons lost deep snapper Tony Norman, and return specialist Hall. Kicker Ryan Harrison, who handles all the kicking and punting duties returns.

In terms of games played and started, the Falcons lost 14 players with 30 career games played, plus four more with 25 career games played. In addition, Air Force only has 17 seniors on its roster this season which ranks as the 19th fewest in the nation.

Air Force defense continues to improve

Air Force's defense has been solid this season. Despite the loss to No. 20 Utah, the Falcons are still among the league leaders in several categories. Air Force ranks third in the conference and 30th nationally in scoring defense with a 17.0 average.

Air Force's defense has had several bright spots this season, which follow below.

Falcons to honor the Air Force again in 2008

The Air Force Academy football team is honoring the the Air Force and and several different units throughout the Air Force this season by wearing patches on its uniforms. The team will wear the Air Force patch to



honor the men and women of the U.S. Air Force. The team will also honor 10 of the Air Force's Heritage Wings and Groups by wearing patches on their home uniforms; and six USAF Air and Space Expeditionary Wings by wearing patches on their away uniforms for the second straight year. The team will wear the Air Force logo on both uniforms for the first time in 2008.

The Heritage Wings and Groups date back to the foundations of the Air Force, beginning on Aug. 1, 1907, when the U.S. Army Signal Corps established a small Aeronautical Division to take

"charge of all matters pertaining to military ballooning, air machines and all kindred subjects." But, it was not until May 26, 1909, that military aviation was born, when Lts. Frank P. Lahm and Benjamin D. Foulois made their first ascent and qualified as the airship's first Army pilots. The National Security Act of 1947 created a separate Department of the Air Force, headed by a Secretary of the Air Force; from that law, today's Air Force was officially born on Sept. 18, 1947.

The 10 patches represent active duty units that have colorful and distinguished histories. These "heritage units" not only represent the legacy of the Air Force past, but also the promise of its future. Each Air Force mission and capability is represented with this cross-section of units.

The Air and Space Expeditionary Force concept is the Air Force's vision for the 21st century to organize, train, equip and deploy forces for contingency operations while remaining ready to meet national crises. AEF also helps create a mindset and culture that embraces the unique characteristics of air and space power - range, speed, flexibility and precision. Military personnel that are deployed become a part of one of these six wings.

Defensive season highlights

■ The Falcons allowed just 10 points in the first two games this season which is the best effort in back-to-back games since allowing 10 points at Army (W, 35-7) and at Wyoming (W, 10-3) in 1998. The 10 points allowed in the opening two games of a season is the second-best in school history and best since the 1963 team allowed just seven in a 10-7 win vs. Washington and a 69-0 victory vs. Colorado State. Both of those games were played in Falcon Stadium.

■ The Falcons have ranked as high as fifth nationally in total defense with an average of 173.0 yards allowed per game. The ranking came in week two.

■ The Falcons held Southern Utah to just 130 total yards, including just seven yards on the ground. Southern Utah managed just eight first downs, was just 2-12 on third-down conversions and never reached the red zone. Southern Utah avoided the shutout late in the third-quarter with an 80-yard touchdown drive. Outside of that one drive, the Thunderbirds managed just 50 total yards and they never got deeper in Air Force territory than the 42 yard line.

■ The 130-yard effort by the defense is the fifth-best single-game effort in school history and best since holding Army to just 100 yards in 1999. The seven yards rushing is the 14th-best single-game effort in Air Force history. Air Force held Southern Utah to just 0.3 yards per rush which is the 10th-best single-game effort in school history.

■ Air Force held Wyoming to 2-13 on third-down conversions and 22:46 time of possession.

■ Air Force scored its first defensive touchdown of the season when senior DE Jake Paulson returned a fumble 25 yards for a touchdown vs. Utah. The score is the first by an Air Force defensive lineman since Bryce Fisher vs. Oregon in the 1997 Las Vegas Bowl.

More on the defense

Air Force has allowed just one score on the opening drive of the first or second half this season. Utah did the honors to open the second half, scoring a touchdown. The Falcons have forced two punts and a fumble in the other three games to open the second half. Air Force has forced opponents to a turnover on downs and three punts on the opening drive of the game.

The Air Force offense has had five turnovers this season and the defense has allowed just three points as a result. On the one score, the defense forced a three-and-out, but Wyoming hit a 47-yard field goal. On the four drives (one turnover vs. Utah ended the game) combined, the defense has allowed just 24 yards on 17 plays.

Air Force offense solid

Air Force ranks fourth in the conference in scoring with a 29.5 scoring average. The Falcons are in their normal position rushing the football, leading the conference with a 281.8 mark, despite a 53-yard effort vs. Utah. The Falcons rank sixth nationally in rushing. Air Force's offense is even giving a helping hand to the defense and its quick start to the season. The Falcons are fourth in the conference and 11th nationally in time of possession holding the ball for 33:20 per game.

In Air Force's 23-3 victory at Wyoming, the Falcons had their streak of six straight games with at least 30 points snapped. The streak was the nation's third-longest.

Mountain West Conference enters 10th year in 2008-09

The Mountain West Conference enters its 10th year of competition in 2008-09. As the league enters its 10th year, some noteworthy things about Air Force and its history in the league follow.

■ Air Force is 35-36 in overall since joining the MWC in 1999 which is a .493 winning percentage.

■ The school's 35 wins rank fifth in the conference while the winning percentage is the sixth best.

■ Air Force vs. the MWC -- BYU (3-6), Colorado State (4-5), New Mexico (4-5), San Diego State (5-4), TCU (1-2), UNLV (6-3), Utah (4-6), Wyoming (6-4).

■ Air Force leads the MWC in non-conference road wins as a member of the conference with a 9-5 overall record. TCU, at 4-2, is the only other school with a winning non-conference road record.

■ Air Force has posted two nine-win seasons as a member of the MWC which is tied for third among conference schools. Utah leads the way with four, followed by BYU with three and Air Force, TCU and Colorado State with two each.

■ Air Force is tied for fourth in the MWC with a 20-14 (.588) home record. The team's 20 home wins ranks third behind BYU (23) and Utah (23).

■ Air Force has scored in all 111 games it's played as a member of the conference, which is the longest streak in the league.

■ AFA has scored in every conference game it's played (73) which leads the conference. New Mexico (62), Utah (62) and Colorado State (56) have the next longest streaks.

Air Force has picked up where it left off last season, collecting two takeaways vs. Southern Utah, five at Wyoming, two at Houston and three vs. Utah. The Falcons have a +7 turnover margin for the season which leads the conference and ranks fifth in the nation.

An old school look

In addition to the Lightning Bolts on each side, the Falcons have had the stripes on the helmet from 1980 to 2006. Air Force originally had just the Lightning Bolts on the helmet for the first 25 years from the program's inception in 1955. There is also a slight alteration to the Lightning Bolts as the silver lining of the blue bolts has been replaced by an all-blue bolt. The Falcons brought back the old-school look last season and will continue in 2008.

National program

Air Force is a national program in every way. The Falcons have 25 difference states represented on its roster which is the fourth most nationally. Only Army (35), Notre Dame (29) and Navy (27) have more. Rounding out the other schools with 20 or more states represented are Stanford (24), Northwestern (23), West Virginia (21) and Colorado (20).

Dekker nominated for AFCA Good Works Team

Air Force senior tight end Travis Dekker is one of 71 nominees for the 71st annual Allstate American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team. The Good Works Team recognizes this group of committed and hard-working players for their off-the-field achievements.

Dekker carries a 3.75 grade point average in biochemistry and has been on the Academy's superintendent's list for military, academic and athletic excellence four semesters. The Albuquerque, N.M., native is a two-year starter for the Falcons and a two-time academic all-conference selection. Last season, he had 25 receptions for 382 yards and caught at least one pass in every game. His catches and yards are the most by a Falcon tight end since 1989. This past summer, he was selected to participate in the Cadet Summer Research Project at the Air Force Research Lab in Albuquerque. He has held numerous leadership positions at the Academy and has also volunteered for several community projects, including the Salvation Army and a helped raise funds for Hurricane Katrina relief in 2005.

Two-way Reggie

Sophomore Reggie Rembert is a busy man during games. Rembert is a starter at cornerback on the defense and is a backup at WR-Z on offense. In addition, Rembert is on the punt and kickoff return teams. Rembert ranks second in the MWC in punt returns this season with a 20.2 average.

Rembert is the first Falcon to play both offense and defense in a game at the Academy since Chris Evans, who played both tight end and defensive end due to injuries against Army in 2006. Evans did not have any statistics and played both only that week. LeRon Hudgins is the last player to play both ways significantly as a safety and running back in 1995. Hudgins was listed as a starter on defense and played most of the season as a backup halfback in the option offense.

In 1967, Carl Janssen was the first Falcon to start on both sides of the ball and on special teams. As the starting wide receiver and three-year player at that position, he led the team with 18 catches for 259 yards and a TD in 1967 and had one carry for two yards. He also started at defensive back. He was third on the team with two interceptions and also had a fumble recovery. Janssen led the team with 23 punt returns for 233 yards, a 10.1 average. He also returned one kickoff for 30 yards.

Rembert highlights

- Had 102 all-purpose yards for a 20.2 average per touch vs. Southern Utah ... also had three tackles.
- Rushed four times for nine yards at Wyoming while returning one punt four yards and one kickoff return 22 yards. He also had four solo tackles and, a tackle for loss and a forced fumble.
- Six solo tackles and the first two tackles for loss of his career vs. Houston ... also recorded his career-long punt return of 53 yards to set up an Air Force touchdown ... the return, which led to a touchdown, ranks as the 11th longest in school history and longest since Matt Farmer returned one 55 yards vs. New Mexico in 1998
- Seven tackles and the first quarterback sack and interception of his career vs. Utah.

Paulson leading the nation

Senior defensive end Jake Paulson is having an outstanding start to the season. Paulson has 7.0 quarterback sacks and leads the nation with a 1.75 per-game average. Paulson is tied for second in the conference and fourth nationally in tackles for loss with 8.0 which is a 2.00 per-game average. He is the only player in the MWC to rank in the top three in each category.

Paulson has been dominant in every game, recording at least one sack in each. Paulson had four tackles, two sacks, a tackle for loss and a safety in the opening game against Southern Utah. He added 1.5 sacks and a forced fumble at Wyoming. Paulson had a career-best seven tackles against Houston, including 2.5 sacks for 19 yards and a pass deflection. He added three tackles and a sack vs. Utah and scored the first touchdown of his career on a 25-yard fumble recovery. The TD is the first defensive score this season and first touchdown by a defensive lineman since Bryce Fisher vs. Oregon in the 1997 Las Vegas Bowl.

Falcons picked sixth in MWC

Two-time defending Mountain West Conference football champion BYU was predicted to capture its third consecutive title in 2008 in a poll of media members. The Cougars made their second straight undefeated run in conference play in 2007, compiling an 8-0 mark against league opponents en route to an 11-2 overall record and a Top 20 ranking in the final USA Today Coaches (t-14), Associated Press (14) and Harris (18) polls.

BYU returns 10 starters from an offensive unit that ranked among the top 25 nationally in passing and total offense a year ago. The Cougars are led by first-team all-MWC honorees Max Hall (QB), Dennis Pitta (TE), Ray Feinga (OL) and Dallas Reynolds (OL). Three starters also return on defense for BYU, which ranked among the top 10 nationally in scoring, rushing and total defense. BYU, which enters the 2008 season with the nation's longest win streak at 10 games, received 29 first-place votes and a total of 299 points.

Utah was chosen second with 274 points and five first-place votes. The Utes tied for third place (5-3) in Conference play in 2007, winning eight of their last nine games and ending the season with a 9-4 mark overall. Utah, which enters the season with the nation's second-longest bowl win streak at seven games, returns six starters from a defense that ranked among the top 20 nationally in scoring, pass and total defense last season.

TCU was picked to finish third after posting an 8-5 record (4-4 MWC) and winning its third consecutive bowl game last season. The Horned Frogs, who return eight starters on offense and six on defense, totaled 239 points in the poll. New Mexico was chosen fourth with 197 points, followed by Wyoming (5th - 156 points), Air Force (6th - 141 points), San Diego State (7th - 92 points), Colorado State (8th - 73 points) and UNLV (9th - 59 points).

Harrison among the best

Senior do-everything kicker/punter Ryan Harrison is off to a near-perfect start this season. Harrison is tied for second in the nation in field goals, averaging 2.00 per game. Harrison is near-perfect hitting eight of nine field goals. Harrison in perfect in 12 extra point attempts to tie for the national lead. He is averaging 9.0 points per game which ranks third in the conference and 31st nationally. He is also a weapon on kickoffs, collecting 15 touchbacks in 24 kickoffs.

Harrison tied a career high with three field goals vs. Southern Utah and Wyoming earlier this season. He had had three consecutive games with three field goals dating back to last year's finale vs. California in the bowl game. He hit his first attempt at Houston to extend his consecutive streak of field goals to 16 before missing from 41 yards. Harrison is a dangerous punter as well, averaging 38.5 yards per punt.

Harrison is tied for fifth in Air Force history in career field goals with 27 which is the most since Joey Ashcroft hit 29 from 2001-03. Harrison has hit 27 of 36 career attempts and his 75.0 percentage ranks fourth all-time at Air Force.

Halderman hauls it

Sophomore Kyle Halderman is one of the big-play men for the Falcons. Halderman is second on the team and ninth in the conference in rushing with a 60.8 per-game average. Halderman rushed for 87 yards on six carries in the season opening win over Southern Utah and scored on a 48-yard dash. Halderman led the Falcons with 85 yards on three carries at Wyoming and broke open the game in the third quarter with a 74-yard run to set up a touchdown to give Air Force a 13-3 lead. The 74-yard run is the longest by a Falcon since Blane Morgan went 80 yards vs. New Mexico in 1998. Halderman rushed for 66 yards on 11 carries against Houston. He has rushed for 243 yards on 24 carries this season and is averaging a conference-best 10.1 yards per carry among the league's top 10 rushers.

Air Force's 1-2 tailback punch

A pair of sophomores make up Air Force's one-two punch at tailback this season. Second-year players Kyle Lumpkins and Savier Stephens are the top two players on the depth chart at tailback. Lumpkin leads the team and ranks sixth in the MWC in rushing with 258 yards on 67 carries and is averaging 3.9 yards per carry. Lumpkin scored the first touchdown of his career vs. Utah, hauling in an eight-yard pass to give Air Force an early 10-9 lead. Stephens is fourth on the team in rushing with 192 yards on 56 carries. He is second on the team in rushing touchdowns with two. The pair has combined for over 100 yards in three of four games this season. They had a season-best 139 vs. Southern Utah. The pair also rushed for 108 at Wyoming and 134 vs. Houston. They were held under the 100-yard mark for the first time this season in the Utah game, finishing with 69 yards on 25 carries.

Smith continues solid play

Senior quarterback Shea Smith has been solid this season in his first year as the starting quarterback. Smith has rushed for 224 yards and leads the team with five rushing touchdowns. He has hit 18 of 36 passes for 228 yards with two touchdowns and three interceptions. He has a 104.87 quarterback efficiency rating. Smith rushed for a career-high 93 yards and a career-best three touchdowns vs. Houston. He threw for a career-best 138 yards and a touchdown on seven of 13 passing vs. Utah. Smith rushed for 91 yards and a touchdown vs. Southern Utah in his first-career start. He is the first Falcon quarterback to win his first three career starts since Chance Harridge in 2002.

Lamendola rolling

Sophomore inside linebacker Ken Lamendola is off to a great start in his first season as a starter. Lamendola leads the Falcons and is tied for second in the conference in tackles with a 9.0 per-game average. After recording just one tackle in his first-career start in the Southern Utah game, Lamendola has chipped in with three straight games of 10 or more tackles. Lamendola had 11 tackles at Wyoming, then added a career-best 12 tackles vs. Houston to lead the team for the first time in his career. He led the team for the second straight week with a career-high-tying 12 stops vs. Utah. He is the first Falcon with three straight 10-plus tackle games since Drew Fowler in 2006.

Head Coach Troy Calhoun

Sometimes people seem born for a particular job or situation. That has never been the case more than Troy Calhoun being the head football coach at the Air Force Academy. Calhoun has led the Falcons to an 12-5 overall mark and is 7-3 in conference games in two seasons.

The coach ushered in a new era of Falcon football in 2007 as Calhoun replaced the legendary Fisher DeBerry, who retired 23 years as head coach. Calhoun, a 1989 Academy graduate, is the sixth head coach in school history and first graduate to hold the position.

Calhoun returned the Falcon football program to its accustomed lofty status in just one season and, in the process, earned a reputation as one of the top young coaches in college football.

Air Force, coming off a three straight losing seasons, finished the 2007 season 9-4 overall and placed second in the Mountain West Conference with a 6-2 mark in Calhoun's first year. The Falcons earned their first bowl bid in five seasons, advancing to the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl in Fort Worth, Texas.

The five-game turnaround from last season, in which Air Force was 4-8, was the largest in the nation by a first-year head coach and tied as the third-largest overall in the nation. The five-game turnaround is the best in school history since the 1958 team had a school-record turnaround of six games.

Air Force's nine wins tied Calhoun for the most wins ever at the Academy by a first-year head coach, matching the mark set by Ben Martin in 1958. The six MWC wins is a new Academy standard and is two wins better than the previous mark for conference wins by a first-year head coach at the Academy. Air Force also posted just the third undefeated home record in school history, establishing Falcon Stadium as one of the toughest venues in the country for visiting teams to visit.

Calhoun was named the conference's coach of the year for his efforts. In addition, he was named coach of the year in Region 5 by the American Football Coaches Association and was one of eight finalists for national coach of the year honors.

The Falcon offense reestablished itself as one of the top units in the MWC. Air Force was second in the conference in scoring offense with a 29.9 per-game average. The Falcons won their 24th conference rushing title and ranked second nationally with a 299.5 average per game. Air Force was also second in total offense with a 419.4 per-game average. Defensively, the Falcons showed tremendous success. Air Force finished fifth in the conference and 22nd nationally in scoring defense with a 21.1 average. The Falcons only allowed four opponents to hit the 30-point mark on the year.

Calhoun brought a wealth of experience and impressive resume at the collegiate and professional levels that is flooded with success at every stop to the Academy.

Calhoun came to the Academy after serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the Houston Texans in 2006. The Texans were one of only two NFL teams to triple their number of wins from the previous year.

They also were the last team to defeat the Indianapolis Colts on their way to the Super Bowl championship. On offense, the Texans had the NFL's leading receiver (Pro Bowler Andre Johnson with 103 catches), the NFL's best quarterback completion percentage (68.4 percent) and quarterback David Carr tied an NFL record against Buffalo with 22 straight completions.

Calhoun became a well-rounded NFL coach, working as a defensive assistant, special teams assistant and offensive assistant with the Denver Broncos from 2003-05. He began his NFL coaching career by serving as the defensive assistant

under defensive coordinator Larry Coyer in 2003. He was a part of the NFL's fourth-ranked defense. The Broncos' defense ranked seventh against the run and sixth against the pass. Denver's defense yielded a mere 17.6 points per game as they made the playoffs for the first time since 2000.

In 2004, Denver utilized Calhoun's offensive prowess moving him to offensive assistant/special teams. On the offensive side of the ball, the Broncos ranked fifth in the NFL, averaging 395.8 yards per game. Broncos' quarterback Jake Plummer set a team record for passing with 4,089 yards and tied a team record with 27 touch-down passes. Coupled with an outstanding passing attack, the Broncos finished fourth in the NFL in rushing. The offense's ability to combine the run and the pass

led to Denver ranking second in the NFL in time of possession with 32:37 per game. The Broncos' special teams connected on 29 field goals, second best in the NFL.

Calhoun worked closely with Broncos head coach Mike Shanahan in the 2005 season, serving as the assistant to the head coach. He helped the Broncos win the AFC West title for the 10th time in their history. Denver reached the AFC Championship game for the first time in seven seasons. Their 14-4 record was the best since Denver finished the 1998 season with a 17-2 mark on their way to winning Super Bowl XXXIII. The offense finished fifth in the NFL averaging 360.4 yards per game. The defense was stout against the run, finishing second in the NFL with 85.2 yards per game. Denver finished with an undefeated record at home during the regular season for the fifth time in team history. During Calhoun's three years in Denver, the Broncos made the playoffs every season, averaging over 11 wins per season.

Prior to the NFL, Calhoun was an offensive coordinator for six seasons on the collegiate level. He began his coaching career at Air Force, where he worked as a graduate assistant from 1989-90. He started at quarterback for the Academy in 1986 and was one of only two freshmen to letter for the 1985 team that finished fifth in the final polls with a 12-1 record that included wins over national powers Notre Dame and Texas.

Calhoun served his country from 1989-95 as an active duty officer in the Air Force. He was the Falcons' recruiting coordinator and the junior varsity offensive coordinator in 1993-94.

He moved to Ohio University in 1995 where he served as the quarterbacks coach for two seasons. Calhoun guided the play of quarterback Kareem Wilson. In 1996, Wilson was named the Mid-American Conference Player of the Year. Wilson set a pair of Ohio records with 282 rushing yards and four rushing touchdowns against Bowling Green. He set an Ohio record with 14 rushing touchdowns in 1996.

Calhoun was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1997. During his first season at the helm, the offense totaled 612 yards against Eastern Michigan, second most in school history. The Bobcats defeated Maryland in 1997, marking the school's first win against a team from the ACC in school history. The '97 Bobcats' 8-3 record was the school's best in 29 years.

During his last season in 2000 at Ohio, the Bobcats won two games against bowl teams, Minnesota and Marshall, for the first time in school history. Calhoun's 2000 offense set a school record with 418.1 yards per game and rushed for a school best 3,553 rushing yards.

Calhoun moved to Wake Forest in 2001. The Demon Deacons were one of only seven teams in the country to score more than 30 points in each of the final four games. During his second season, Wake led the ACC in total offense with 408.1 yards per game. His offense had a league-best 990 plays and was efficient with the ball, committing only 16 turnovers to lead the ACC. The 2001 season culminated with a 38-17 bowl victory over Oregon to give Wake Forest its first back-to-back winning seasons since the ACC expanded from eight teams.

Groomed on the basics of integrity and passion, Calhoun is a native of Roseburg, Ore., and was raised in a home where both kids graduated from the Air Force Academy and were varsity letterwinners on nationally-ranked teams. Calhoun's younger sister, Callie, is a 1991 Academy graduate and four-year letterwinning in track and cross country. Calhoun finished at the Academy on the superintendent's list and graduated with over a 3.0 grade point average and a military performance average of better than 3.0. He and his wife, Amanda, live in Colorado Springs and have two children, Tyler (six) and Amelia (four).
