Records: Wake Forest is 7-5 overall (4-4 in the ACC) after defeating Vanderbilt, 23-10, in the Deacs' regular season finale on Nov. 29 in Winston-Salem. Navy comes in at 8-4 following a 34-0 shutout of Army on Dec. 6.

Rankings: Wake Forest and Navy are both unranked. The Deacons were ranked in the top 25 for eight weeks this season, one week shy of the school record.

Wake Forest Coach Jim Grobe: Grobe (Virginia '75) is in his eighth season at Wake Forest and has a record of 53-44. Grobe, who spent six seasons at Ohio University, is in his 14th year as a head coach and has a career mark of 86-77-1.

Navy Coach Ken Niumatalolo: Niumatalolo (Hawaii '89) is in his first season at the helm of the Midshipmen and holds a record of 9-4. He spent the previous six seasons as an assistant coach at Navy under current Georgia Tech head coach Paul Johnson.

WAKE PLAYS NAVY IN INAUGURAL EAGLEBANK BOWL

Wake Forest will get a rematch with Navy in the inaugural EagleBank Bowl to be played Dec. 20 at RFK Stadium in Washington D.C. The game will be broadcast nationally on ESPN as well as over the air on the Wake Forest ISP Radio Network.

Wake Forest has earned a trip to a bowl game for the third straight year, a first in school history.

Wake Forest will enter the bowl game with a 7-5 overall record after finishing tied for third in the Atlantic Coast Conference's Atlantic Division.

Navy comes into the game with an 8-4 mark after shutting out rival Army 34-0 on Saturday, Dec. 6.

The Deacons won their regular season finale, defeating Vanderbilt 23-10 on Nov. 29 at BB&T Field. The victory made Wake's 16 seniors the winningest class in school history with a 31-19 record.

Navy won the regular season meeting with the Deacons, posting a 24-17 win at BB&T Field on Sept. 27. It was the first loss of the year for Wake Forest, which started the season 3-0 and was ranked No. 15 in the country.

This bowl game will mark the first time since 1945 that Wake Forest has played a team twice in a season. In that year, the Deacons played South Carolina to a 13-13 tie during the regular season before downing the Gamecocks, 26-14, in the Gator Bowl on Jan. 1, 1946.

Wake Forest holds a 6-3 advantage in the all-time series with Navy that dates back to 1929. The Deacons had won four straight over the Midshipmen until this year's loss.

Wake Forest opened the season with its first-ever win in or against the state of Texas. Riley Skinner completed 27 of 36 passes and had a career-best three TDs, while Chip Brinkman caught his first two career TDs. The Deacs scored on each of their first three possessions of the game, and the defense forced four turnovers. Sam Swank booted a pair of field goals, one from 40 yards out and another from 42.

Sam Swank's 41-yard field goal with three seconds left in the game lifted Wake Forest to a thrilling 30-28 defeat of Ole Miss. In a contest that featured six lead changes, the Rebels scored a touchdown to go up 28-27 with 1:01 remaining. The Deacs drove 57 yards on nine plays to set up Swank's game-winner. D.J. Boldin caught 11 passes for 123 yards, while Riley Skinner completed 32 of 43 passes with 2 TDs.

The Wake defense forced seven turnovers, and Sam Swank made a career-high four field goals to lead the Deacs past Florida State, 12-3. The Deacon defense was stifling, getting five interceptions and two fumble recoveries. Wake did not let FSU advance past the Deacs' 20-yard line all game. Kevin Patterson led the defense by forcing three turnovers on his own -- two interceptions and one forced fumble.

Navy scored 17 of its points off six Wake Forest turnovers, as the Midshipmen pulled off a 24-17 upset of the No. 15-ranked Demon Deacons. Navy dominated the ground game, rushing for 292 yards on 59 carries. Eric Kettani finished with 175 rushing yards, the first 100+ game by a Deacon opponent since Sept. 22, 2007. D.J. Boldin led Wake Forest with eight catches for 116 yards.

Riley Skinner hit D.J. Boldin on a 7-yard TD pass with 5:28 remaining in the game to send Wake Forest to a 12-7 defeat of Clemson. The Deacons held the Tigers' vaunted running attack to just 21 yards on 23 carries. Clemson was also just 2-of-14 on third downs. Skinner rushed for a career-high 73 yards on 11 carries. Shane Popham replaced the injured Sam Swank and kicked two field goals.

Maryland handed Wake Forest its first shutout since 1998, defeating the Demon Deacons 26-0 to create a four-way tie for first in the ACC Atlantic Division. Wake recovered two fumbles in Terrapin territory but could not convert them into points. The Deacs missed both of their field goal attempts in the game, as Sam Swank sat out his second straight contest with a strained quad.

Wake Forest could not hold on to a 10-3 halftime lead as Miami rallied back to post a 16-10 defeat of the Deacs. Mike Rinfrette scored on a 1-yard plunge to cap Wake's first drive of the game, but the Deacs could not find the endzone the rest of the day. Josh Adams led a rushing attack that produced 195 yards on 52 carries. Adams finished with 111 yards on 21 rushes. Wake completed 3 of 8 passes on the day.

Shane Popham hit the game-winning 28-yard field goal in OT, and Alphonso Smith ended the game with an INT to send Wake Forest to a 33-30 defeat of Duke. The Blue Devils missed a 42-yard field goal attempt as time expired in regulation. Brandon Pendergrass rushed for a touchdown, and D.J. Boldin caught a TD pass from Riley Skinner. Aaron Curry and Chip Vaughn had 16 and 13 tackles respectively.

Wake Forest raced out to a 28-3 halftime lead and then held on for a 28-17 defeat of Virginia. Brandon Pendergrass rushed for 110 yards and a touchdown to make the Deacons bowl eligible and give Wake its first win vs. UVA in Winston-Salem since 1983. The Deacons forced four turnovers, including a 53-yard INT return for a TD by Kevin Patterson. Devon Brown and Ben Wooster also caught TD passes.

QB Russell Wilson accounted for all three NC State touchdowns as the Wolfpack posted a 21-17 comeback defeat of Wake Forest. The Deacons led 17-14 entering the fourth quarter but could not hold on. WR D.J. Boldin threw a 64-yard TD pass to Marshall Williams for Wake's first score. Williams finished with seven catches for a career-high 116 yards. Boldin also caught a TD pass from Riley Skinner.

Boston College scored on a QB sneak with 1:12 to play to edge Wake Forest 24-21 on Senior Day. The Wake offense managed just 191 total yards, the lowest total ever in the Jim Grobe Era. Kevin Patterson and Kyle Wilber each scored on fumble recoveries.

Riley Skinner completed 13 of 20 passes for 173 yards.

Wake Forest will make its third straight bowl appearance for the first time in program history. The Deacons will have a re-match against Navy, who defeated Wake Forest 24-17 earlier in the season. It will mark the first time in 63 years that the Deacs have played the same team twice in one season. Wake is 5-3 in eight all-time bowl appearances. The Deacons are 6-3 all-time against the Midshipmen.





TEAM NOTES

LAST TIME OUT

Wake Forest closed out the regular season with a 23-10 win over Vanderbilt on Nov. 29. The win gave the Deacs a 7-5 record and marked the first time in school history that Wake had won seven or more games in three straight seasons.

After a Vanderbilt field goal gave the Commodores a 3-0 lead, the Deacons bounced back with a 42-yard Sam Swank field goal to tie the game. It was Swank's second game back after missing six games with a strained quadriceps muscle.

The Deacons went ahead 10-0 early in the second quarter when Brandon Pendergrass scored on a six-yard run. It was his team-leading fifth TD of the season. The touchdown culminated a 98-yard drive which began when safety Chip Vaughn intercepted a Vanderbilt pass at the Deacon two-yard line.

Wake Forest went up 17-3 in the third quarter when Kevin Harris scored from eight yards out. It marked Harris' first rushing touchdown since hitting paydirt twice against Liberty on Sept. 30, 2006.

Vanderbilt scored on the first play of the fourth quarter to cut the deficit to 17-10 before the Deacons sealed the game with Rich Belton's four-yard TD run. The touchdown was set up by Alphonso Smith's interception at the Vanderbilt eight.

Smith's interception was the 20th of his career, putting him in a tie for the ACC all-time record.

DEACON DEFENSE PROVIDES POINTS

In 2007, Wake Forest led the nation with 10 non-offensive touchdowns and eight defensive scores. Wake Forest had six interception returns and two fumble returns for scores.

In 2008, Wake has scored on defense three times. The first was a 53-yard interception return by safety Kevin Patterson against Virginia on Nov. 8.

The Deacon defense scored twice against Boston College on Nov. 22. Patterson tallied his second score of the year with a 15-yard fumble return. DE Kyle Wilber scored his first collegiate touchdown with a two-yard fumble return as well.

The defense also set up the offense against BC when Gelo Orange blocked a punt that the Deacons recovered on the one-yard line. Riley Skinner threw a TD pass on the next play.

ACC DEFENSES SLOW OFFENSES

Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe has mentioned what a tough conference the ACC is defensively in 2008. The statistics bear him out.

Eight of the ACC's 12 teams are ranked among the top 41 schools in the nation in terms of total defense. Boston College is sixth in the nation, allowing just 273.4 yards per game. The ACC's top defensive units also include Virginia Tech (eighth in the nation), Florida State (13th), Clemson (17th), Wake Forest (19th), Georgia Tech (23rd), Miami (25th) and Virginia (41st).

Because of those stingy defenses, there is not a single ACC team ranked in the top 45 in the nation in total offense. Georgia Tech is 46th in the country with 377.3 yards per game.

BOWL ELIGIBLE FOR THIRD STRAIGHT YEAR

Wake Forest's win over Virginia on Nov. 8 was its sixth of the year, making the Deacons bowl-eligible for a third straight season. When Wake Forest was invited to the Meineke Car Care Bowl in 2007, it marked the first time in school history that the Deacons went to bowl games in back-to-back years. Wake Forest appeared in the FedEx Orange Bowl in 2006.

With four bowl trips in his eight years, Jim Grobe owns the school mark for the most bowl trips by a Wake head coach.

NINE OPPONENTS BOWL ELIGIBLE

Nine of Wake Forest's opponents in 2008 will be in post-season bowl games. ACC Champion Virginia Tech will play in the FedEx Orange Bowl while runner-up Boston College will be in the Music City Bowl. Clemson has been invited to the Gator Bowl, while Maryland will participate in the Humanitarian Bowl.

Miami will play in the Emerald Bowl, while Vanderbilt has earned a trip to the Music City Bowl vs. BC. Florida State will play in the Champs Sports Bowl, and NC State received an at-large bid to the Papajohns.com Bowl. The only teams Wake Forest faced this year that will not visit the postseason are Baylor, Duke and Virginia.

SEVEN WINS THREE CONSECUTIVE YEARS

For the first time in school history, Wake Forest has won seven or more games in three consecutive years. The Deacons went 11-3 in 2006, 9-4 in 2007 and are currently 7-5.

Wake Forest had not won six or more in three straight years since 1946-48 (18-11 cumulative record). Under the direction of head coach D.C. "Peahead" Walker, the Deacs went 6-3 in 1946, 6-4 in 1947 and 6-4 in 1948.

FOUR+ ACC WINS FOR FIRST TIME EVER

For the first time in school history, Wake Forest has posted three straight seasons with four or more ACC victories. Wake finished 4-4 in ACC play in 2008 and is a combined 15-9 in conference play over the past three seasons.

DEACONS SET ATTENDANCE MARK

Wake Forest set a season attendance record at BB&T Field this fall. The Deacons drew 221,582 fans to seven home games, breaking the previous attendance record of 197,911 which was set in 2003.

Wake Forest ranks 17th in the nation in attendance as measured against capacity. The Deacons averaged 100.53 percent of capacity (31,500) in 2008.

STRONG SCORING DEFENSE

Wake Forest ranks 19th in the nation and fifth in the ACC in total defense and 17th nationally in scoring defense. The Deacons are allowing just 18.3 points per game this year. Wake's defense has allowed 17 or fewer points in six of its 12 games. A year ago, the Deacons were seventh in the ACC in scoring defense, yielding 22.2 points per game.

WAKE SECOND NATIONALLY IN TAKEAWAYS

Wake Forest is second in the nation in takeaways with 35. Boston College leads the nation with 36. The Deacons have 18 fumble recoveries and 17 interceptions on the year.

Wake Forest is tied for third in the nation in turnover margin at +16 (+1.33 per game). Over the last nine games, the Deacons are averaging just 0.89 turnovers lost per game. While the Deacs have lost just eight turnovers over that span, the Deacon defense has produced 18 takeaways.

Of Wake's 244 points scored this season, 111 have come off 35 opponent turnovers. Last year, the Deacs had 108 points off 35 forced turnovers.

Over the previous two seasons, the Deacons tied for the national lead in creating turnovers. Wake, Oregon State, South Florida and BC each forced 65 turnovers from 2006-07.

In Jim Grobe's 7+ seasons at Wake Forest, the Deacons are +65 in turnovers, having gained 221 and lost 156.

DEACONS EXCEL AT PUNT COVERAGE

Wake Forest leads the nation in punt return yardage defense. The Deacons have allowed just 11 punt returns for a total of eight yards, an average of .73 yards per return. Even more amazing is that the longest punt return against the Deacons this year is just two yards.

Give credit to punters Sam Swank and Shane Popham who have had 29 of 68 punts (43%) killed inside the opponents' 20-yard line. Of those 68 punts, 29 have been fair caught and just four have gone for touchbacks.

DEACONS GO DOWN TO THE WIRE

Nine of Wake Forest's 12 games this season have been decided late in the fourth quarter. Wake has won three games decided by a TD or less and lost four times by seven or fewer. Here's a quick recap of the final drives of those games:

Ole Miss: Wake Forest took possession with 1:01 to play in the game trailing 28-27. Sam Swank won the game with a 41-yard field goal with three seconds left.

Florida State: Wake held a 12-3 lead in the fourth quarter and intercepted FSU on each of its final three possessions.

Navy: Wake scored with 1:14 to play to pull within 24-17. Navy recovered the onside kick, earned a first down and then ran out the clock.

Clemson: The Deacs stopped the Tigers on downs with 3:37 to play. Wake then gained a first down and ran out the clock.

Miami: Wake trailed 16-10 and punted with 3:13 to play. UM was able to earn two first downs and run out the clock.

Duke: Tied at 30, the Blue Devils missed a 42-yard field goal as time expired in regulation. Wake scored an overtime field goal and then intercepted a Duke pass to seal the win.

Virginia: Stanley Arnoux's interception with 2:10 to play in the game ended Virginia's final scoring threat.

NC State: NC State took the lead with 10:17 remaining in the game. Wake punted on its next two possessions then regained the ball with 2:50 to play. Wake reached the NC State 25 before losing the ball on downs.

Boston College: The Eagles took the lead with 1:12 to play. Wake reached the Eagles' 39 before losing the ball on downs.

INTERCEPTIONS RISING

Kevin Patterson's 53-yard interception return for a touchdown on Nov. 8 against Virginia marked the 20th time in the Jim Grobe Era that a Deacon has returned an INT for a score. Prior to Grobe's arrival, in 44 seasons from 1956 through 2000, Wake Forest returned just 17 interceptions for touchdowns.

Wake Forest has intercepted an opponent's pass in 28 of 39 games over the last three seasons and in 36 of the last 50 contests since the start of the 2005 season.

OPPONENTS ON TARGET ON FIELD GOALS

Wake's defense has done an excellent job of keeping opponents out of the endzone and limiting them to FG attempts. However, those opponents have not missed many attempts.

Wake's foes had connected on 10 straight FG attempts and 10 of 11 total tries until Duke's Nick Maggio missed a potential game-winning 42-yarder as time expired on Nov. 1.

Wake Forest's opponents have hit on five straight field goal attempts and on 15 of 17 tries this season. The Deacs have made 18 of 28 FG attempts.

WAKE FOREST'S MAGIC NUMBER

Wake Forest's magic number is 24. Under Grobe, the Deacs are 42-13 when scoring 24+ points. When scoring fewer than 24 points, Wake Forest is only 11-31 and 3-5 this season.

Since the start of the 2006 season, the Deacs are 19-1 when scoring 24 or more points. The only loss during that span was a 38-28 setback in the 2007 season opener at BC.

Wake Forest is 8-11 when scoring less than 24 points since the start of the 2006 campaign.

WAKE WINNING CLOSE GAMES

Since the start of the 2006 season, Wake Forest is 11-6 in games decided by seven points or less. In the four seasons prior to 2006, the Deacons went 8-12 in games decided by seven points or less. Wake Forest was a perfect 5-0 in close games in 2006 and is 3-4 this season.

IT SEEMS LIKE THEY'RE ALL CLOSE GAMES

Jim Grobe has coached 97 games at Wake Forest and posted a record of 53-44. During Grobe's tenure, the Deacons have won 29 games by eight points or greater and lost 22 games by eight points or greater. The other 46 games have all been by seven points or fewer and Wake has a record of 24-22. Wake is 15-7 in games decided by three points or fewer.

DEACONS SPENT EIGHT WEEKS IN TOP 25

Wake Forest spent eight weeks ranked in the top 25 this season before falling out on Oct. 19. The stretch was one week shy of the record nine weeks set during the 2006 season.

For the first time in school history, Wake Forest opened a season ranked among the top 25 teams in the country in either the AP or USA Today Coaches Polls. The Deacons were 23rd in each of the two major preseason polls.

Ranked No. 20 in the Week 2 polls, Wake stood as the only ACC team ranked in the AP Top 25 for the first time ever.

The Deacs climbed as high as No. 15 in the Coaches Poll and No. 16 in the AP Poll this year.

PRESEASON FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL

Wake is one of only nine schools nationally and the only ACC school to appear in the USA Today Coaches preseason poll in both football and basketball. The Deacons were ranked 23rd in the football poll and were 24th in the basketball poll.

The only other schools included in both polls are Texas (10th in football/8th in basketball), Tennessee (18/13), Oklahoma (4/14), Arizona State (16/15), Florida (5/19), USC (2/T21), Wisconsin (12/T21) and Kansas (13/23).

WINNING SENIOR CLASS

This year's senior class will finish as the winningest class in school history. The 2008 seniors own a 31-19 (.620) record since the start of the 2005 season. That tops the previous best four-year record of 28-21 (.571), set by the 2007 seniors. The top winning percentage ever achieved was .722 by the classes of 1946 (19-7-1), 1925 (19-7-1) and 1893 (6-2-1).

WAKE'S WINNING TRADITION

Wake Forest is in the midst of its most successful period of football in school history. The Deacons are 27-12 overall and 15-9 in ACC play since the start of 2006. Since 2000, Wake has won 29 ACC games, which is the most wins in a decade, besting the previous high of 20 wins during the 1960s.

Guaranteed a finish of over .500 in 2008, this marks the first time since 1950-52 that the Deacs have posted three straight winning records. Wake was 6-1-2 in 1950, 6-4 in 1951 and 5-4-1 in 1952.

Wake Forest was one of 18 schools in the nation that won 20 or more games between the 2006 and 2007 seasons. Virginia Tech and BC were the only other ACC schools to do so.





INDIVIDUAL NOTES

NOTING THE VANDERBILT GAME

Wake Forest concluded its regular season with a 23-10 win over Vanderbilt on Nov. 29. The win assured the Deacons of a winning record for the 2008 season.

- The Vandy game marked the final home game for Wake Forest's 16 seniors. They concluded their careers at BB&T Field with a home record of 17-8.
- The Deacons attracted a crowd of 25,902 which set a season attendance mark of 221,582.
- CB Alphonso Smith moved into a tie for the ACC career mark for interceptions. Smith has 20 picks in his career.
- P/PK Shane Popham booted a career-long 59-yard punt.
- WR D.J. Boldin caught eight passes to bring his career receptions total to 103.
- RB Kevin Harris and FB Rich Belton each had their first rushing TD since 2006.
- Redshirt freshman OT Doug Weaver earned his first career start in place of the injured Barrett McMillin. Starting LT Jeff Griffin moved to LG to replace McMillin, and Weaver was inserted at LT.

DEACONS LAND FIVE ON ALL-ACC TEAM

Wake Forest placed five players on the All-ACC team as selected by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association.

CB Alphonso Smith and LB Aaron Curry were each first team selections on defense, while WR D.J. Boldin earned first team honors on offense. QB Riley Skinner was an honorable mention choice as was NG Boo Robinson.

Smith was a repeat selection on the first team, while Curry moved up from second team status last year. Skinner was a second team selection in 2006 as a redshirt freshman.

SMITH NAMED NAGURSKI FINALIST

CB Alphonso Smith was one of five finalists for the Bronko Nagurski Award, which is given annually to the nation's top defensive player by the Charlotte Touchdown Club.

Smith was joined by TCU DE Jerry Hughes, USC LB Rey Mauluga, Texas DE Brian Orakpo and Florida LB Brandon Spikes. Texas' Orakpo won the award, which was handed out at a gala banquet in Charlotte on Dec. 7.

BOLDIN LEADS ACC IN RECEIVING

Senior D.J. Boldin has been Wake Forest's go-to receiver this season. Boldin ranks first in the ACC and 26th nationally in receptions per game. Boldin's 77 catches equates to an average of 6.4 per game.

Boldin is the ACC leader in receptions with 77 for 782 yards and three touchdowns. Boldin's 77 receptions mark the second-highest total in a season for a Deacon. WR Kenny Moore set the school and ACC record for single season receptions with 98 last year. Desmond Clark had 72 receptions in 1997.

Boldin has a pair of 100-yard receiving games this season. On Sept. 6 against Ole Miss, he caught 11 passes for 123 yards. His 11 receptions matched his season total from 2007, while he came within four yards of matching his yardage total from 2007 as well.

Boldin posted his second 100-yard receiving game of the season when he collected eight catches for 106 yards on Sept. 27 vs. Navy.

The senior wide receiver came into the year with 26 career receptions for 351 yards and no touchdowns. His seven-yard, game-winning TD catch against Clemson marked his first career touchdown.

SKINNER EARNS THIRD 2,000-YD SEASON

Riley Skinner became just the third quarterback in Wake Forest history with three seasons of 2,000 or more passing yards. Skinner threw for 173 yards against Vanderbilt on Nov. 29 to push his season total to 2,181 yards.

Skinner threw for 2,051 yards as a redshirt freshman in 2006 and followed that up with 2,204 as a sophomore in 2007.

Skinner is just the third Wake Forest quarterback with three 2,000-yard seasons. He is joined in this select club by Brian Kuklick (1996-98) and Gary Schofield (1981-83).

Skinner's career passing total now stands at 6,436 yards. That is the fourth-highest total in school history and 21st-best in ACC history. Skinner's career yardage total falls in between No. 20 Shawn Moore (Virginia 1987-90) who threw for 6,629 yards and 22nd Danny Kanell (Florida State, 1992-95) with 6,372 yards.

SKINNER CHASING SCHOOL RECORDS

QB Riley Skinner enters the EagleBank Bowl with 628 career pass completions. He ranks third in school history in completions and could move into second place with 10 more completions. Just a junior, Skinner ranks fourth in school history in attempts (938), yards (6,436) and total offense (6,512).

He is Wake Forest's career leader in career completion percentage (67.0) and passing efficiency (130.87).

Skinner stands in fifth place with 33 career TD passes.

CURRY HAVING MONSTER SEASON

Wake Forest senior strongside LB Aaron Curry is having a year worthy of postseason accolades. The 6-3, 247-pound redshirt senior leads the Deacons with 101 tackles including 15 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks. He ranks sixth in the ACC in tackles and is third in tackles for loss.

For his career, Curry has amassed 328 tackles, 44.5 tackles for loss and 9.5 sacks. He ranks third all-time in school history in tackles for loss.

Curry has four games of 10 or more tackles including a career-high 16 stops against Duke on Nov. 1.

On the year, Curry has led the Deacons in tackles in six of 12 games. His 101 stops this season is a career best. He had 99 tackles last year as a junior.

CURRY A LOTT TROPHY FINALIST

Senior LB Aaron Curry is one of four collegiate defensive players to earn a spot on the Lott Trophy list of finalists.

Curry leads the Deacons with 101 tackles and 15.0 tackles for losses this season. He recorded a career-best 16 tackles in the win over Duke on Nov. 1.

Curry, a preseason All-American by a number of publications, was selected as the Lott Trophy IMPACT Player of the Week presented by Wachovia for his performance at Florida State Sept. 20 (8 tackles, interception, fumble recovery).

Named after Hall of Famer Ronnie Lott, The Lott Trophy is awarded to college football's Defensive IMPACT Player of the Year. Now in its fifth year, The Lott Trophy is the first and only college football award to equally recognize athletic performance and the personal character attributes of the player.

The other three finalists include LB James Laurinaitis of Ohio State, DE Brian Orakpo of Texas, and DB Myron Rolle of Florida State.

The winner will be announced at a black-tie banquet in Newport Beach, Calif. on Sunday, Dec. 14.

POPHAM GETTING THE HANG OF IT

P/PK Shane Popham has found his niche over the last four games. After being thrust into the spotlight in the wake of Sam Swank's quadriceps injury, Popham struggled early as the starting punter. Over his first four starts, Popham averaged 36.6 yards on 24 punts with eight punts landing inside the opponent's 20-yard line.

However, over the last four games, he has averaged 41.3 yards on 21 punts. Popham has placed 11 of those 21 punts inside the opponents' 20-yard line. He has had three punts of 50 yards.

Popham also grew accustomed to his role as Wake's place-kicker. He started out just 3-for-8 in field goal attempts over his first three starts but went a perfect 4-for-4 over the next three contests. That stretch included the game-winning 28-yard field goal that beat Duke on overtime on Nov. 1.

With Swank's return to the lineup against Boston College on Nov. 22, Popham has continued to handle all the punting chores. He has shared kickoff responsibilities with Andrew Wright over the last three games.

WOOSTER NAMED TO ALL-ACADEMIC SQUAD

Wake Forest TE Ben Wooster has been named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District III first team.

Wooster, a 6-5, 235-pound redshirt junior from Suwanee, Ga. (Greater Atlanta Christian), is Wake Forest's third-leading receiver this year with 23 receptions for 203 yards and two touchdowns.

A health and exercise science major, Wooster holds a 3.57 grade point average as a fourth-year junior. As a first team all-district selection, Wooster's name will now appear on the ballot for Academic All-America honors.

Wooster is a member of Omicron Delta Kappa, the national leadership honorary and is a member of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and the Athletic Director's council. He has earned Dean's List honors all six semesters and was picked for the ACC's Top Six for Service Award.

Wooster is also a member of Mortar Board Honor Society, Alpha Epsilon Delta, the national pre-med honor society, and volunteers at the Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center Emergency Room.

In order to be eligible for the Academic All-District team, a student-athlete must be a starter or important reserve and must maintain a GPA of at least 3.30.

In 2007, Louis Frazier was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America first team as an offensive tackle.

SMITH TIES ACC INTERCEPTION MARK

Senior CB Alphonso Smith recorded an interception against Vanderbilt on Nov. 29 that ensured his place in ACC history. Smith's fourth-quarter pick tied him with North Carolina's Dre' Bly (1996-98) as co-holders of the ACC record with 20 career interceptions.

Smith, who has six interceptions this season, already owns the school's career mark. He had two interceptions on Nov. 1 against Duke to set the school record for career thefts.

Smith's first pick vs. Duke, which came in the third quarter, was the 18th of his career and broke the school record formerly shared by Ronnie Burgess (1981-84) and A.J. Greene (1985-88).

Smith's overtime interception that sealed the win over the Blue Devils was the 19th of his career.

Against Florida State on Sept. 20, Smith made an interception on the opponent's first play from scrimmage for the third

time in the past two seasons. He picked off Christian Ponder and returned it 18 yards to set up a Sam Swank field goal.

Last year, Smith picked off Boston College's Matt Ryan and returned it 21 yards for a score in the season opener. In the final regular season game of the year, Smith stole a pass by Mackenzi Adams of Vanderbilt on the first play of the game.

DEACON ROOKIES SEEING ACTION

Wake Forest has started a pair of true freshmen in TE Andrew Parker and LG Joe Looney in three games this season (at Miami; vs. Duke; vs. Boston College). Both were pressed into starting roles by injuries to other players.

Looney became a starter after C Trey Bailey suffered a broken ankle at Maryland, necessitating a move by LG Russell Nenon to C. Looney has since made six straight starts.

Parker started the Miami and Duke games in place of Ben Wooster who had been sidelined with a strained hamstring he suffered in the Maryland game. Wooster returned to the starting lineup on Nov. 8 vs. Virginia but Parker started vs. Boston College on Nov. 22.

This marks the first time since 2000 that Wake has started two true freshmen. Against Virginia on Sept. 27, 2000, the Deacs started Quinton Williams at CB and Tyson Clabo at RG.

Including Looney and Parker, only five true freshmen have started a game during the Jim Grobe Era. That list includes CB Eric King in 2001, DE Jyles Tucker in 2003 and OG Chris DeGare in 2005.

The Deacons also started three redshirt freshmen against the Blue Devils in RB Brandon Pendergrass, CB Josh Bush and DE Kyle Wilber. Due to injuries, redshirt freshmen OT Doug Weaver and P/PK Shane Popham also saw considerable playing time against Duke.

True freshman Chance Raines has also taken snaps at center in a pair of games this fall. This marks the first time since 2002 that Wake has played three true freshmen in a season. RB Chris Barclay, WR Chris Davis and P Ryan Plackemeier all saw time as true freshman in 2002.

SWANK'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS

With Sam Swank's return to the Wake Forest lineup, he is continuing his ascension on the ACC's all-time scoring and field goal lists. Already Wake Forest's career scoring leader, Swank's 334 career points places him third among the ACC's all-time scoring leaders.

Former Maryland kicker Nick Novak (2001-04) is the ACC's all-time leader with 393 points, while Xavier Beitia of Florida State (2001-04) is second all-time with 375 points.

Swank has kicked at least one field goal in 39 of 44 career contests. He has converted 71 career field goals, the second-most in ACC history. Swank also has 20 career multi-field goal games.

Swank was the ACC and national leader with 2.5 field goals per game at the time of his injury. He missed six games before returning against Boston College on Nov. 22.

Against Florida State on Sept. 20, Swank kicked a career-high four field goals, hitting from 48, 29, 49 and 31 yards.

Prior to his injury, Swank had a chance to surpass both the ACC and NCAA records for career field goals made. The ACC mark is 80 by Maryland's Nick Novak (2001-04) and the NCAA mark is 87 by Georgia's Billy Bennett (2000-03).

For his career, Swank has made 71 of 92 FG attempts for 77.2 percent, and he is 121-for-122 on PATs. Swank had made his first 121 PAT attempts of his career until missing his final attempt against Vanderbilt on Nov. 29.





NCAA ACTIVE CAREER STAT LEADERS

Wake Forest has two players who are battling for the active lead in a career statistic among all Bowl Subdivision players.

Sam Swank has 71 career field goals, which puts him six behind Penn State's Kevin Kelly for the most of any active player in Division I-A.

Alphonso Smith is the NCAA's active leader with 20 career interceptions and four career interception returns for touchdowns.

AS SKINNER GOES, SO GO THE DEACS

Since becoming the starting quarterback in the second game of his redshirt freshman season, Wake Forest has gone 18-3 when Riley Skinner does not throw an interception.

The only three games Wake has lost when Skinner did not throw a pick were against Virginia Tech in 2006 and at Maryland and at Miami in 2008.

Skinner is the winningest QB in school history with 25 wins in 36 career starts under center. He surpassed Mike Elkins (1985-88) who held the previous record with 18 career wins.

SKINNER'S GAME-WINNING DRIVES

QB Riley Skinner has posted two fourth-quarter, game-winning drives this season (vs. Ole Miss; vs. Clemson), giving him five for his career:

vs. Duke - Sept. 9, 2006: Trailing 13-7, Skinner takes the Deacs 63 yards in seven plays resulting in a game-winning two-yard TD run by Micah Andrews with 1:28 to play that gave Wake a 14-13 win. The game was Skinner's first career start.

vs. Georgia Tech - Dec. 2, 2006 (ACC Championship): With the score tied at 6-6, the Deacs started at their own 20 and drove to the Georgia Tech 8 before Sam Swank booted a 22-yard field goal with 2:55 to play. Skinner completed 4-of-4 passes for 68 yards on the drive, including a 45-yard completion to Willie Idlette that put the Deacs in field goal range.

vs. Maryland - Sept. 22, 2007: After missing the previous two games with a separated shoulder, Skinner returned to action vs. the Terps. Wake fell behind 24-3 and trailed 24-10 entering the fourth quarter. Skinner cut the deficit to seven when he scored on a 1-yard run. He then tied the game on a 6-yard TD pass to John Tereshinski with three seconds left. The Deacs won in OT, 31-24, on Josh Adams' 6-yard run.

vs. Ole Miss - Sept. 6, 2008: In a game that featured six lead changes, Ole Miss went up 28-27 with 1:01 left to play. Skinner engineered a nine-play, 57-yard drive that set up the

Deacs at the Rebel 23-yard line. Swank booted a 41-yard FG with three seconds remaining for the winning score.

vs. Clemson - Oct. 9, 2008: Trailing 7-6 with 10:33 to play in the game, Skinner drove the Deacons on a 15-play, 78-yard drive that resulted in a 7-yard TD pass to D.J. Boldin that gave the Deacs the 12-7 win. On the winning drive, Skinner completed seven of nine passes for 69 yards. Skinner hit Boldin on a 28-yard pass to convert a third-and-24 early in the drive.

SKINNER ON TARGET

QB Riley Skinner continues to post remarkable completion percentage statistics. On the season, Skinner has completed 221 of 352 passes for 62.8 percent. He has thrown 12 touchdowns to seven interceptions.

In 2007, Skinner led the nation in pass completion percentage at 72.4 percent. He completed 236 of 326 passes for 2,204 yards and 12 touchdowns. Skinner bested Texas Tech's Graham Harrell, who finished with a mark of 71.8 percent.

KINGS OF FLORIDA

Wake Forest has 26 Florida natives on its 2008 roster, which is the most of any team in the traditional Big Six conferences (plus Notre Dame) not based in the Sunshine State.

A total of 15 Florida natives on the Deacons' 2008 roster helped to lead their team to a state championship while in high school.

BACK-TO-BACK ROOKIES OF THE YEAR

Wake Forest has had two of the last three ACC Rookies of the Year. In 2006, QB Riley Skinner won the award after leading the Deacs to an 11-3 record, the ACC Championship and a berth in the FedEx Orange Bowl.

In 2007, RB Josh Adams was the league choice for Rookie of the Year. Adams set school records for the most rushing yards (953), rushing attempts (219), receptions (219), rushing TDs (11) and total TDs (12) by a redshirt freshman.

Wake Forest's back-to-back ACC Rookies of the Year marked the first time since 1998-99 that a school accomplished the feat. NC State's Ray Robinson (RB) and Koren Robinson won the award in 1998 and 1999, respectively.

Prior to that, North Carolina had the only other occurrence of consecutive ACC Rookies of the Year. The Tar Heels' Amos Lawrence (RB) and Darrell Nicholson (LB) did it in 1977 and 1978.

COACHING STAFF & PROGRAM NOTES

GROBE BY THE NUMBERS

Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe will coach his 98th game and has a record of 53-44 in his eighth year at Wake Forest and 86-77-1 in his 14th year as a college head coach. Prior to Grobe's arrival, the Deacons were 33-64 in their previous 97 games.

Under Grobe, Wake Forest is 28-36 in ACC games and 29-21 in all home games. The Deacons are 25-8 under Grobe in non-conference games and 13-5 at home against non-ACC opponents. With 28 career ACC wins, Grobe is Wake's all-time winningest coach in league contests, and he now has twice as many league wins as any other Wake Forest football coach.

GROBE AT BB&T FIELD

Jim Grobe is Wake Forest's all-time winningest coach in games played at BB&T Field, Wake Forest's home since 1968.

Grobe has gone 29-21 at BB&T Field, the most wins of any of the nine Demon Deacon coaches who have coached in the stadium. Grobe's average of 3.6 home wins per year is the highest among Deacon coaches. His home winning percentage of .580 is second only to Cal Stoll who went 9-4 (.692) during his three seasons from 1969-71.

STAFF STABILITY

When Jim Grobe was named Wake Forest's head coach prior to the 2001 season, he brought almost his entire coaching staff with him. Only four coaches have left the staff since.

Troy Calhoun, Grobe's first offensive coordinator, left following the 2002 season to join the Denver Broncos and is now the head coach at Air Force.

Kevin Sherman, who coached wide receivers, returned to his native Virginia as an assistant at Virginia Tech following the 2005 season.

Following the 2007 season, defensive coordinator Dean Hood left to become the head coach at Eastern Kentucky, and quarterbacks coach Jeff Mullen was named the offensive coordinator at West Virginia.

To replace Hood and Mullen, Grobe brought in Steve Russ, one of Grobe's former linebackers at Air Force and most recently the defensive coordinator at Syracuse, and Brian Knorr.

Knorr was a part of Grobe's staff at Ohio and became the head coach of the Bobcats when Grobe moved to Wake. Knorr joined the Deacons from the Air Force Academy where he was the assistant head coach and inside linebackers coach.

WAKE'S COLLECTION OF AIR FORCE GRADS

Wake Forest has three graduates of the Air Force Academy on its coaching staff. The list of former Falcons includes offensive coordinator Steed Lobotzke (AFA '92), tight ends/fullbacks coach Steve Russ ('94) and wide receivers coach Brian Knorr

('86). It is the largest collection of Air Force graduates on a Division I-A coaching staff other than at the Academy itself.

REDSHIRTING FRESHMEN

Head coach Jim Grobe has built the Wake Forest program into an ACC contender in part by redshirting the vast majority of incoming freshmen. Grobe is not opposed to playing first-year players but insists that they be good enough to be on the field for 20 or 30 plays per game, not counting special teams.

Through Grobe's first seven years, just 10 players stepped on the field as a true freshman. Three true freshmen have played for the Deacs this season.

Last season, WR Jordan Williams played as a true freshman and caught nine passes for 141 yards and one touchdown. Williams made his collegiate debut at Navy on Oct. 20 and played in each of the final seven games of the season.

EXPERIENCE COUNTS

Wake Forest has 33 players who are in their fourth, fifth or sixth year in the program. The Deacons have 14 redshirt seniors (including one graduate student) and 19 redshirt juniors on the roster.

Despite the veteran presence, Wake is tied for 16th in the nation in fewest scholarship seniors (14) on its 2008 roster.

Where Wake gains its veteran advantage is the contributions of this group of seniors. Of the 14, 10 are listed as starters including seven on defense, two on offense and Sam Swank on special teams.

The other four scholarship seniors are listed as backups on the two-deep. Ryan McManus, a walk-on senior, is also a key special teams contributor as the holder on field goals.

Among ACC schools, Wake Forest has the second-fewest scholarship seniors. North Carolina has the least with 11, while Wake Forest and Virginia Tech follow with 14 apiece.

DEACONS IN THE NFL

A total of 20 former Deacons were in NFL training camps this past summer. That tied for the most-ever former Deacons on NFL rosters at one time. Wake Forest also had 20 players on NFL rosters in 2003 and 2004. Of that total, 14 former Deacons are on a current NFL roster.

Last season, former Demon Deacon Fred Robbins became the ninth Wake Forest alumnus to win the Super Bowl, as Robbins was a key part of the New York Giants' 2007 title run.

WAKE FOREST MOVES UP TWO SPOTS

Wake Forest University moved up two spots to No. 28 on the 2009 U.S. News & World Report's listing of the top national universities in the country. Wake Forest was ranked 30th last year and has been in the top 30 every year since 1997.

WAKE FOREST VS. NAVY

Wake Forest holds a 6-3 advantage in the all-time series with Navy that dates back to 1929. This is the first time that these two teams have met in a bowl or on a neutral field.

Navy won the last meeting, 24-17, on Sept. 27 at Wake Forest's BB&T Field. Prior to that, the Deacons had claimed four straight wins in 1998, 2000, 2002 and 2007. Two of the last three games between the two teams have been decided by a touchdown or less.

LAST TIME VS. NAVY - SEPT. 27, 2008

No. 15 Wake Forest committed six turnovers, and Navy turned those miscues into 24 points as the Midshipmen upset the Deacons, 24-17, on Sept. 27, 2008, at BB&T Field.

The Deacons committed six turnovers in the game, the most miscues committed by a Wake Forest team since the Deacs committed six turnovers against Miami on November 12, 2005. QB Riley Skinner threw a career-high four interceptions, and the Wake Forest offense fumbled the ball two times to account for the six turnovers.

Navy dominated the ground game, rushing for 292 yards on 59 carries, while the Deacons rushed for only 43 yards on 31 carries. Navy passed the ball four times in the contest for 51 yards, while Wake passed the ball 40 times, completing 26 of those passes for 270 yards. The Midshipmen out-gained the Deacons 343-313.

Navy's Eric Kettani ran for 175 yards, becoming the first opponent to rush for more than 100 yards against Wake Forest since Maryland's Keon Lattimore on September 22, 2007.

Trailing 17-0 at halftime, the Deacs cut the deficit to 17-10 after the third quarter. However, Jarod Bryant's TD run with 3:45 remaining in the game sealed the win for Navy.

D.J. Boldin led Wake with eight catches for 116 yards. Skinner completed 26 of 40 passes for 270 yards.

RB Josh Adams rushed for a TD, while FB Mike Rinfrette caught a touchdown pass from Skinner.

WAKE-NAVY CONNECTIONS

A number of Deacons will be playing against former high school teammates. Navy has two graduates of The Bolles School in Jacksonville, Fla. in RB Andre Byrd and LB Clint Sovie. Wake Forest totals four graduates of Bolles in QB Riley Skinner, DT John Russell, C Chance Raines and LB Scott Betros.

Navy OLB Craig Schaefer and FB Kevin Campbell are graduates of Robinson Secondary in Fairfax, Va., as is Deacon safety

Chip Vaughn.

Navy senior DE Will Scarle is a graduate of H.B. Plant HS in Tampa, as is Wake freshman RB Lovell Jackson.

Navy has seven players who are natives of North Carolina.

GROBE VS NON-CONFERENCE FOES

In Jim Grobe's 7+ years at Wake Forest, the Deacons have compiled an impressive 25-8 record against non-conference opponents. Wake Forest went 3-1 in non-conference games in 2008 with wins over Baylor, Ole Miss and Vanderbilt. The lone loss was at home to Navy. At neutral sites, Grobe's Wake Forest teams are 3-1 with wins in the ACC Championship game in 2006, in bowl games in 2002 and 2007 and a loss in the FedEx Orange Bowl following the 2006 season.

GROBE VS SERVICE ACADEMIES

After having spent 11 years as an assistant coach at the Air Force Academy, Jim Grobe has had success as a head coach in games against the U.S. service academies. At Wake Forest, Grobe has gone 2-1 vs. Navy with wins in 2002 and 2007 and a loss in 2008. The Deacons defeated Army last year, giving Grobe a 3-1 mark while at Wake. As the head coach at Ohio University, the Bobcats dropped a 37-20 contest at Army in 1996. Grobe has never faced Air Force as a head coach.

COMMON OPPONENTS

Duke is the lone common opponent between Wake Forest and Navy. The Midshipmen dropped a 41-31 decision to the Blue Devils on Sept. 13 in Durham. Wake defeated Duke, 33-30, in overtime on Nov. 1 in Winston-Salem.

DEFENSING NAVY

Wake Forest has played Navy in each of the last two seasons and is yet to find a way to slow the Midshipmen's attack. In Navy's 24-17 win at BB&T Field on Sept. 27, Eric Kettani led the Middies with 175 yards rushing. It marked the only time this season that an individual rushed for over 100 yards against the Deacons.

In fact, no other team managed that many yards vs. Wake this year. Navy ground out 292 yards vs. Wake Forest in 2008 and had 328 rushing yards in 2007.

Wake is currently 21st in the country in stopping the run, allowing just 116.1 yards per game. If you subtract Navy's rushing yards, the Demon Deacons would rank 12th nationally in rush defense.

JIM GROBE

HEAD COACH

8th Season
Virginia, 1975

Wake Forest head football coach Jim Grobe is in the midst of piloting the Demon Deacons through the most successful period in school history.

After seven seasons at the helm, Grobe has built a football program that has been to back-to-back bowl games and proven itself to be an annual contender for the Atlantic Coast Conference championship.

In 2007, Grobe led the Deacons to a 9-4 record including a 24-10 win over Connecticut in the Meineke Car Care Bowl. Combined with last year's 11-3 record, Wake Forest has won 20 games in the last two seasons. Only 18 members of the NCAA's Football Bowl Subdivision have won 20 or more games since the start of the 2006 season. Among the nine wins in 2007 were victories over North Carolina, NC State and Duke. Never before had Wake Forest swept the Big Four series in consecutive seasons. And never before had Wake won as many as 20 games in just two seasons.

Wake Forest was successful in 2007 because of an efficient offense and an opportunistic defense. The Deacons led the nation in non-offensive touchdowns, scoring on six interception returns, two fumble returns, a kickoff return and a punt return. Wake's eight defensive touchdowns were also the most of any FBS team in the country. Offensively, the Deacons set a school record for the most points scored in a season and tied the school mark with 44 touchdowns.

Wake Forest's success in 2007 was not limited to the field. The Deacons had their first Academic All-America football player in many years when offensive tackle Louis Frazier was named to the first team.

During his first seven seasons at Wake, Grobe has set numerous milestones that were never previously achieved by a Deacon football coach. Grobe has taken the Deacons to back-to-back bowl games for the first time in school history. He is the only coach to take Wake Forest to three bowl games in a career. And, with a 46-39 record in seven seasons with the Deacons, he is the first coach in over 50 years to have a career mark of seven games over .500.

The success of the Deacons in 2007 came as no surprise to those who have watched Grobe build the Wake Forest program from the ground up. In his first five years on the job, Grobe was busy building respectability. In the last two years, he has been busy chasing championships.

The 2006 season was one to remember for all Wake Forest fans. Grobe led Wake Forest to its second-ever ACC Championship and its first since 1970. The Deacons won the ACC's Atlantic Division title after being picked to finish last by the league's media in the preseason. The 11 wins posted by the 2006 team set a school record as Wake was the

most improved team in the nation, following a 4-7 record in 2005. The Deacs were ranked in the AP top 25 for nine straight weeks in 2006, the longest streak in school history and beat Florida State in Tallahassee for the first time since 1959 while posting their first win over N.C. State in Raleigh since 1984. Grobe's hard work was rewarded by his unanimous selection as the ACC Coach of the Year. He was selected as the National Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association, the Bobby Dodd Foundation, the Associated Press, The Sporting News and CBSsportsline.com.

Grobe was hired in December 2000 to take over a Demon Deacon football program long regarded as an afterthought in the ACC. He inherited a Wake Forest program that won only 38 games in the 1990's.

Football observers have recognized Grobe's efforts in transforming Wake Forest into one of the rising programs, not just in the ACC, but on a regional and national level.

The levels of excitement and expectation surrounding Demon Deacon football have reached unprecedented heights. That is a tribute to Grobe and his staff who believe the best is yet to come.

Grobe, 56, has gained a national reputation as a builder of programs.

In seven seasons, Grobe's teams have won 46 contests, earned three bowl berths and won an ACC Championship.

That is particularly impressive given the recent ACC expansion that introduced three nationally-prominent programs to the league.

Even with the rising level of play in the conference, making the ACC arguably the nation's best football league, Wake Forest has become even more competitive and successful.

Football observers have already recognized Grobe's efforts in transforming Wake into one of the rising programs, not just in the ACC, but on a regional and national basis.

"Ever since Jim Grobe arrived in Winston-Salem, this program has been soaring upward," ESPN's Ron Franklin said.

Long before Wake Forest's breakout season in 2006, the Deacons had performed very well against in-state opponents. Since Grobe's arrival, Wake Forest has defeated every Division I opponent in the state, including a 5-0 mark against East Carolina, 7-0 vs. Duke, 4-2 vs. North Carolina, 4-3 vs. NC State, plus victories against I-AA Appalachian State and North Carolina A&T. In all, Grobe's Deacons are 22-5 against in-state teams.

In short, Grobe has put Wake Forest in position to be extremely competitive in one of America's best football leagues, the ACC, for many years to come.



The two touchdown catches for Brinkman were the first two of his career. Brandon Pendergrass also scored for the first time in his career with a TD run in the first half.

Defensively, redshirt senior Aaron Curry led the team with seven tackles and fellow senior Alphonso Smith recorded his 15th career interception.



Swank's heroics came after Ole Miss quarterback Jevan Snead scrambled out of the pocket and found Cordera Eason for a 4-yard touchdown on 4th and 3, giving the Rebels a 28-27 lead with 1:01 remaining in the game.





WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - No. 15 Wake Forest (3-1, 1-0 ACC) committed a season-high six turnovers and Navy (3-2) turned those miscues into 24 points as the Midshipmen upset the Demon Deacons 24-17 in front of 33,173 fans at BB&T Field.

The Deacons committed six turnovers in the game, the most miscues committed by a Wake Forest team since the team committed six turnovers against Miami on

November 12, 2005. Quarterback Riley Skinner threw a career-high four interceptions and the Wake Forest offense fumbled the ball two times to account for the six turnovers.

Navy dominated the ground game, rushing for 292 yards on 59 carries, while the Deacons rushed for only 43 yards on 31 carries. 

The Wake Forest defense was also very good on third downs, holding Clemson to 2-of-14 on third down attempts. The Deacons were successful on third down plays, converting 10 of 21 third-down attempts.

Skinner combined for 259 yards of total offense, including a career-high 73 yards rushing on a career-high tying 11 attempts. Skinner threw for 186 yards and one touchdown pass.

The 12 points scored by Wake Forest were the fewest points needed for a home victory since 1994 when the Deacons defeated Appalachian State 12-10.



COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Maryland's defense suffocated the Wake Forest offense and held the Demon Deacons scoreless for the first time in over ten years in a 26-0 victory Saturday afternoon at Byrd Stadium.

The victory for Maryland (5-2, 2-1 ACC) creates a logjam at the top of the ACC Atlantic Division. Maryland, Florida State, Boston College and Wake Forest (4-2, 2-1 ACC) are now all 2-1 in the conference.

The Maryland defense held Wake to just 219 yards of total offense and it was the first time the Deacons were shutout since a 42-0 setback at Air Force on Sept. 5, 1998.







WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - Wake Forest (6-3, 4-2 ACC) raced out to a 28-3 lead at halftime and held off a late Virginia rally to defeat the Cavaliers (5-5, 3-3 ACC) 28-17 on Saturday in front of a season-high crowd of 34,014 at BB&T Field.

The win gave the Deacons their sixth win on the season, marking the third straight year that Wake Forest has recorded at least six wins. The last time the Deacs had six

wins in three straight years was from 1946-1948.

Wake Forest defeated Virginia in Winston-Salem for the first time since the 1983 season, when current Virginia coach Al Groh led Wake Forest to a victory over the Cavaliers. Virginia now leads the overall series 34-13.

With the victory, Wake Forest moves into a tie for first place with Florida State, with identical 4-2 records in Atlantic Coast Conference play. The Deacs hold the tiebreaker over the Seminoles by virtue of their 12-3 win in Tallahassee earlier in the season.

Brandon Pendergrass enjoyed his best day in a Wake Forest uniform, running for a career-high 110 yards and one touchdown on a career-best 27 carries. Devon Brown led Wake Forest in receiving with 58 yards on a long touchdown catch.

Demon Deacon quarterback Riley Skinner was 14-of-20 for 130 yards and a pair of touchdowns and no interceptions. Skinner three four interceptions against Navy on Sept. 27 but has not thrown one since, spanning 132 pass attempts.

The big play for the Wake defense was a 53-yard interception return for a touchdown by safety Kevin Patterson. The touchdown was the first of his career and the first defensive touchdown for the Deacs since Nov. 7, 2007 against NC State.







WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - Wake Forest (7-5, 4-4 ACC) closed the regular season with a 23-10 victory over Vanderbilt (6-6, 4-4 SEC) on Saturday night at BB&T Stadium.

The Deacons have now won seven games in a season for the first time in school history and have posted a winning record in three consecutive years for the first time since 1950-52.

Wake Forest outgained Vanderbilt in the game 331-249. The Deacs held a 158-116 advantage on the ground, while compiling 173 passing yards to 133 for the Commodores.

Senior wide receiver D.J. Boldin finished the game with a team-high eight catches and 73 yards. With the eight grabs, Boldin eclipsed the 100 reception mark in his career as he now has 103 catches as a Deacon.
